

# 2017 OEC EMPLOYEE CHARITY FOCUSES ON VETERANS THIS YEAR



Since 2004, the Oconto Electric Employee Charity effort has awarded \$68,000 to charities and organizations. Each year the Oconto Electric Cooperative (OEC) employees choose a different organization as the recipient of its fund-raising efforts.

Several events are held throughout the summer, with the donations being made to the recipients in late fall or after the new year. Employees have held charity lunches, bag lunch to go, jean days, a motorcycle ride, golf outings, and candy bar sales.

This year OEC asked for grant applications and had a great response. The funds raised will be split between Old Glory Honor Flight and Patriot Guard Riders – Wisconsin. (452201)



Old Glory Honor Flight is dedicated to transporting our local WWII and Korean War veterans to Washington, D.C., to see the memorials built in their honor. It is a one-day trip and

completely free of charge to the vet!

Old Glory Honor Flight is proud to announce that it is now accepting Vietnam Veteran applications and expect to begin flights in 2017.

Old Glory Honor Flight is funded primarily from individuals across Northeast Wisconsin who recognize the great accomplishments and sacrifices of veterans and want them to have the chance to visit their nation's capital.



The Patriot Guard Riders – Wisconsin is an all-volunteer organization that provides support for active military personnel and veterans and their families. Their main mission is to honor our fallen heroes, their families, and communities by attending memorial services and funerals. They also participate in cere-

monies and events to welcome our troops home from overseas or to give them a resounding show of support when they leave the states for foreign countries. They are completely funded by donations and other than minor administrative expenses, all funds go directly to benefit those they serve.

Funds raised by OEC employees will go towards their Help on the Homefront Services. Under their Help On The Homefront program, they provide the essentials for veterans who have completed rehabilitation programs and are again contributing to society.

Most often, veterans leaving the VA recovery programs leave with little more than the clothes on their backs. Patriot Guard Riders provide veterans with a bed, tables, chairs, TV, entertainment center, kitchenware, bed and bedding, all usually donated by individuals. When there is a lack of donated goods, Patriot Guard Riders will use monetary donations to purchase items for the veterans.

Past recipients of the OEC Employee Charity include: Oconto Area Humane Society, Oconto Falls Friends of the Firefighters, Lena Public Library, and many more.

#### **KEEP YOURSELF FROM HAVING TO DIG OUT OF TROUBLE**

If you had a new fence to install at home, you would likely research property lines, ordinances, and fence types. Then you would get to the point of purchasing, prepping, and assembling

materials to get work started. However, you would still not be ready to dig. There is a very important step missing—calling 811.

811 is a free service that will have buried public utilities marked on your property so that you can safely dig around them. Just call 811, or submit an online request at call 811.com, at least a few business days before you plan to dig.

Digging without having utility lines marked can result in damage to electric, gas, communications, water, and sewer systems. According to the Common Ground Alliance (CGA), every six minutes an underground line is damaged because someone began to dig before calling 811.

When contacting 811, make sure that you have clearly identified your planned

digging area and outline it in white paint if possible. The service uses ground-penetrating radar to search for and locate the buried public utility lines that are on your property. Lines will be marked with flags or paint. The color indicates the type of utility located. After the area has been marked, the CGA reports that you have less than 1 percent chance of causing

damage if you respect the markings.

If you have any private utilities, you will need to hire a private utility locator. Some examples (863403) of private utilities include: underground sprinkler system, invisible fences, data communication systems, private water systems, or gas piping to a garage.

If you do not know what facilities are on the property, look for clues to tell you what might be under ground, like a propane storage tank, gas meters, a detached garage or outbuilding with lights, a grill or pool on the property, manhole lids, storm drains, and pavement patches.

Even if you have had an area marked before, call to have the area checked again. Natural changes to the soil, such as erosion or root growth, can alter the depth and lo-

cation of buried lines. Once all buried lines have been marked, respect the boundaries, and dig carefully.


Perhaps you have seen them raising their bucket trucks in howling winds and torrential rains, or in freezing, icy conditions. They work around the clock near high-voltage power

### THUNDERSTORM SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN RED CROSS

When thunderstorms are rolling your way, stay safe with these helpful tips from the American Red Cross:

- Listen to local news or NOAA Weather Radio for emergency updates. Watch for signs of a storm, like darkening skies, lightning flashes, or increasing wind.
- Postpone outdoor activities if thunderstorms are likely to occur. Many people struck by lightning are not in the area where rain is occurring.
- If a severe thunderstorm warning is issued, take shelter in a substantial building or in a vehicle with the windows closed. Get out of mobile homes that can blow over in high winds.
- If you can hear thunder, you are close enough to be in danger from lightning. If thunder roars, go indoors! The National Weather Service recommends staying inside for at least 30 minutes after the last thunder clap.
- Avoid electrical equipment and telephones/cellphones. Use battery-powered TVs and radios instead.
- Shutter windows and close outside doors securely. Keep away from windows.
  - Do not take a bath, shower, or use plumbing.
- If you are driving, try to safely exit the roadway and park. Stay in the vehicle and turn on the emergency flashers until the heavy rain ends. Avoid touching metal or other surfaces that conduct electricity in and outside the vehicle.
- If you are outside and cannot reach a safe building, avoid high ground; water; tall, isolated trees; and metal objects such as fences or bleachers. Picnic shelters, dugouts, and sheds are NOT safe.

#### Sign Up for Our AC Load Management Program

Oconto Electric Cooperative is offering a one-time \$25 credit on your electric bill for new participants in our AC Load Management Program (central air-conditioning units only, NOT for room units). You will also receive an \$8 credit on your electric bill during the months of June, July, August, and September, provided that you have used at least 400 kilowatt hours during the billing month. If you sign up for the program, we will install a Load Management Receiver (LMR) on your air conditioner just like the receivers we install on electric water heaters.

If you are concerned about having your air conditioner controlled all day, that is not how it will work. There will be cycles of approximately 30 minutes on and 30 minutes off during the control periods. Your home will still be cool, and OEC will still be saving money. Control periods are Monday through Friday, approximately 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

We have over 1,475 satisfied members already on the program. This equates to an approximate overall co-op savings of \$54,000 per month in demand charges, and we are trying to increase that savings.
