Community Change Grants Available



OEC is committed to the communities we serve. We support local schools, community organizations, and agencies through donations and programs that OEC offers. Many OEC employees are active with local groups and organizations, which enriches the cooperative's relationship with the people we serve.

Since 1999 Oconto Electric members have had the opportunity to participate in a wonderful program called Community Change. Members can (47500) sign up to have their electric bills rounded up to the next whole dollar, with the extra money going into the Community Change fund.

Community Change has a board of directors (a group of seven volunteers who are co-op members not employed by OEC) that meets quarterly in March, June, September, and December to review applications for Community Change funds. Grants are awarded based on how much money is available and whether or not the purpose of the request is consistent with Community Change guidelines. The Community Change board has awarded over \$179,000 in donations since 2000.

COOPERATION AMONG COOPERATIVES Cooperative Principle #6

High winds on September 21 left thousands of Michigan residents in the dark. Alger Delta Cooperative Electric Association called in ROPE (Restoration Of Power in an Emergency) crews to help restore power. Crews from Bayfield Electric, Eau Claire Energy, Oakdale Electric, and Oconto Electric stepped in to help.

ROPE is a very unique program of co-ops helping co-ops. It is managed by Dairyland Power Cooperative. In the event that a major storm causes extensive damage to a cooperative's distribution system, that co-op can call Dairyland Power to ask the ROPE program for help. Dairyland Power will then call neighboring co-ops that were unaffected by the storm to help restore power to the affected co-op's system.

So no matter who is involved, cooperative principle number six is a key factor in the success of co-ops.

DECK THE HALLS SAFELY

There's nothing like putting up lights and decorations to get you in the holiday spirit. It's something that many do each and every year without incident, yet the holidays are also one

of the most hazardous times of the year when it comes to electrical fires and accidents. The utility safety organization, Safe Electricity, offer several tips as you deck the halls this season:

- When decorating outside, look up and around for power lines. Never throw lights or other decorations into trees near power lines.
- Keep ladders, equipment, and yourself at least 10 feet from power lines.
- Match plugs with outlets. Do not force a three-pronged plug into a two-pronged outlet or extension cord.
- Outside, use only lights, cords, animated displays, and decorations rated for outdoor use. Follow the manufacturer's instructions on how to use them. Ensure outdoor outlets or extension cords are equipped with Ground Fault Circuit

Interrupters (GFCIs).

• Never string more than three strands of lights together unless the packaging says it is safe to do so. The lights could

overload and start a fire.

- Do not staple or nail through light strings or electrical cords. Use plastic or insulated hooks to hang lights.
- Do not attach cords to utility poles.

The outside of your home is not the only place where you need to be cautious of electrical dangers. Use care when placing and decorating trees inside your home. Place

fresh-cut and artificial trees away from heat sources such as registers, fireplaces, and radiators, and water fresh-cut trees frequently. Turn lights off before you go to sleep. A timer can be a great help with this.
