
## DISTRICT MEETINGS WILL HIGHLIGHT FUTURE RATE CHANGES

# Cooperative Principle #2 Democratic Member Control

Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their members, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. Elected representatives (directors/trustees) are elected from among the membership and are accountable to the membership. In primary cooperatives, members have equal voting rights (one member, one vote); cooperatives at other levels are organized in a democratic manner.





## **OEC EMPLOYEES DID IT AGAIN** \$14,000 raised for local organizations

Co-op principle number seven: commitment to community. Oconto Electric Cooperative (OEC) employees really take this

principle to heart. Since 2004, OEC employees have awarded \$96,000 to charities and organizations. (883801)

OEC employees worked all year to raise \$9,000 and promote awareness for the selected charities. The largest events were the charity golf outing, candy bar sales, and the Bag Lunch To Go. CoBank, one of the co-op's lenders, also donated \$5,000 as part of its Sharing Success program. Employees were able to distribute \$7,000 to Down Syndrome Association of Wisconsin (DSAW) and \$7,000 to Bridge the Gap, Inc.

DSAW Green Bay Chapter serves approximately 60 families across Brown, Oconto, Marinette, Door and Kewaunee counties. It is a volunteer driven organization that is 100% funded by private individuals, corporations and foundations. DSAW, which started in 2008, provides support through awareness, education, information, programs, services and the exchange of ideas and experiences. The orga

It is estimated that more than 3.5 million Americans live with an autism spectrum disorder. Bridge the Gap, Inc., founded by Lesley Laluzerne in 2008, helps families navigate the challenges that those face living with autism, with special attention paid to individual needs.

Bridge the Gap provides programs such as daily living skills, individual/group

therapies, summer camps, preschool, sensory swim, teen programs, individualized education plan assistance, social skills classes, friendship groups, employment and community support. Located in Shawano, this incredible non-profit organization funded by donations and grants, continues to grow.
