Oconto Electric Cooperative can help ease your mind

Oconto Electric Cooperative (OEC) has provided the Main-Street Messenger program since 1999 with excellent results. MainStreet Messenger is an emergency response service that helps make independent living a reality while giving peace of mind to the families whose loved ones prefer to stay in the comfortable surroundings of their own home.

We have over 130 clients, who, along with their families, are very pleased with our program. We provide ongoing support to our valued MainStreet Messenger clients. We're just a phone call away to answer your questions or provide service on the equipment. We are here to help you.

MainStreet Messenger Unit Options

We have units available which connect to your working home telephone line, or units that can work off of a cellular network. Landline units cost \$30 per month with a one-time installation fee of \$25. Cellular units cost \$40 per month with a on-time installation fee of \$35.

How MainStreet Messenger Works

A medical alert pendant will be given to you to wear around your neck or on your wrist. When you push the button on your pendant, it will signal the Cooperative Response Center (CRC) that you need help. Within seconds, someone from the response center will attempt to speak with you through the speaker on the unit. At that time you will communicate with CRC to request the help you need. CRC will then contact someone from the list of responders that you provided during

the installation, and let them know that you need assistance. Responders should be people who live near you so they can respond to your need for help quickly. CRC can also call a rescue squad if the situation requires additional help.

Customer Support

A cooperative employee is available seven days a week to help you with such things as maintenance of the unit or pendant. There are no extra fees for these services. At the time of installation we will gather information including your address, phone number, and medical history, as well as names and addresses of the people you would like called if you need help. If any of this information changes, simply give us a call and we will take care of getting those changes to the response center.

How do I get my MainStreet Messenger?

Simply call the office at (920) 846-2816 or toll-free 1-800-472-8410 and ask for Katie Jagiello. She will schedule the installation or answer any questions you might have.

When you buy power from an investor-owned utility, the control lies with the chief executive officer. You have no say in who that person is, and you probably don't know what state that person lives in, or even where the board meetings are held. The profits made by investor-owned utilities go to the investors.

When you are a member of OEC, you are also a part owner. The profits made by OEC go to you in the form of capital credits. The control lies with our board of directors. The seven people on our board are all local people who live and work in this area and are elected by you. The decisions they make affect their lives as much as yours and mine. You, our member,

can help decide who guides our cooperative.

January is district meeting time for OEC. District meetings are held for members to nominate candidates for election for the upcoming board of director terms. The persons nominated must reside within the district they are running for. If there are two nominations, those names will be placed on a ballot, and every member of OEC is entitled to vote at the annual meeting on March 28, 2020.

Being a cooperative member has benefits and responsibilities. To make the cooperative system work, it is your responsibility to attend the district and annual meetings to cast a vote and make your voice heard.

In December, all members in Districts 4 and 6 will receive an official notice of the meetings. All OEC members are welcome to attend district meetings, but only the members from the specific district will be eligible to vote. These meetings also provide Oconto Electric the opportunity to keep our members updated with co-op information.

Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their members, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions.

Elected representatives (directors/trustees) are elected from among the membership and are accountable to the membership. In primary cooperatives, members have equal voting rights (one member, one vote); cooperatives at other levels are organized in a democratic manner.

Government-in-Action Youth Tour

Visiting a place like Washington, D.C., might sound like a far-away dream for

high school students who grow up in rural Wisconsin. But every year, several cooperative students are given the opportunity to travel to the capital for an intensive weeklong tour—and it doesn't cost them a dime.

In June, the Wisconsin Governmentin-Action Youth Tour, sponsored by the state's rural electric cooperatives in conjunction with the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA), sends select students on an all-expense-paid trip to the nation's capital. In Washington, tour participants get to see with their own eyes sights many have only experienced in history books or on television.


In addition to visiting monuments, museums, and historical sites that would be part of any standard tour, the students also fulfill the goal of then U.S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson, who inspired the Youth Tour when addressing the NRECA annual meeting in 1957, for

young people to "actually see what the flag stands for and represents."

Tour participants get to meet their members of Congress, hear inspirational speakers, and interact with other Youth Tour participants from across the country. Additionally, Wisconsin students have the chance to witness the wreath-laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery, see the Sunset Parade at the Iwo Jima War Memorial, and tour the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives chambers.

During the intense week on the gotraveling, eating, and touring together-many of the Youth Tour participants form fast friendships that continue after they return home. Inspired by their trip, many Youth Tour alumni have gone on to become co-op leaders or perform other public service. Ask almost any of the alumni about their experience, and they will describe it as "the trip of a lifetime." (959600)

2-1/2 Cups Graham Cracker Crumbs 1 Tub Chocolate Frosting (can use no sugar version, but regular works just as well) ½ Stick Butter at room temp. (don't melt) 1 Carton Dipping Chocolate (Bakers in section by chocolate chips) 1 Cup Walnuts (ground up)

Mix butter and frosting with mixer, add graham crackers. Make into 1" balls (I used my drop cookie utensil). Cool in refrigerator for half hour. Melt chocolate in microwave according to instructions on carton. Dip chocolate balls half-way into chocolate and then dip into nuts. Refrigerate until set. Store in air tight container.
