After eight years of planning and fundraising, the Oconto Falls Area Veterans Monument was dedicated on November 9, 2019. The monument is located just south of the Oconto Falls School District administrative office. The monument features an 8-foot-high main wall that tapers on each side. A large courtyard extends from the wall, with seven flag poles on the edge. The seals of the five branches of the military can be found in the center of the wall. Currently the wall has 450 sponsored bricks with the names of veterans and their years of service.

While enjoying various Memorial Day festivities this month, I hope you will join me in pausing to reflect on the sacrifices of our country's veterans and their families. I am especially thankful for those who gave the ultimate sacrifice so that we can enjoy the freedoms in this great country of ours.

At the national level, we support the Vets Power Us program, which is aimed at employing and honoring veterans, active military and their spouses. Oconto Electric Cooperative is committed to the communities we serve. We support local schools, community organizations, and agencies through donations and programs that OEC offers. Many OEC employees are active with local groups and organizations, which enriches the cooperative's relationship with the people and communities we serve.

Our employees are dedicated to co-op principle number seven: Commitment to Community. Our employees have distributed \$113,000 to local charities and organizations since 2004. Employees organize several fundraising efforts throughout the year, with funds awarded in late fall.

Funds raised in 2020 will be split between Little River Fire Department and the Green Valley-Morgan Fire Company.

Turnout Gear

Little River Fire Department was established in 2013. Fire Chief Jonathon Ladwig and 15 dedicated personnel currently serve the community. The department is in need of nine new sets of turnout gear. The gear costs \$2,057 per set and expires

every 10 years. Currently the department has nine firefighters who are using expired turnout gear, which means they are unable to enter burning structures. The gear not only helps protect them from fire, but protects them from sharp jagged metal and broken glass while working at vehicle accident sites.



Air-Packs

Green Valley-Morgan Fire Company is lead by Fire Chief Leonard Wahl. Twenty-three fire personnel and six

support personnel currently make up the fire department. Funds that are raised will go toward the purchase of five new Scott SCBA-Air Packs. This

equipment is essential for a firefighter to enter a burning structure. Each pack will cost the department \$4,595. We hope to raise enough money to cover the cost of two.

1- Yellow Cake Mix 3 Cups Cut Rhubarb 1 1/4 Cup Sugar Cinnamon 1 Pint Heavy Whipping Cream

Mix cake as directed on the box. Pour cake into a 9x13 greased cake pan. Cut rhubarb into small pieces and mix with sugar, distribute evenly over cake. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Pour whipping cream over cake. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-50 minutes. Let cool in pan for 30–45 minutes. Place serving tray on top of the cake and flip it over. Let cake settle by itself.
