

BEAUTIFY YOUR YARD, NOT UTILITY EQUIPMENT **Utility Equipment Needs to be Accessible 24/7**

Springtime means time for outdoor projects. Even when located on your property, electrical equipment is the property of Oconto Electric Cooperative and must be accessible to our crews at all times. Why?

Emergencies

In the event of a fire, crews must be able to shut the power off before firefighters can begin their work. Every second counts during such a critical event.

Maintenance

OEC routinely checks and maintains meters and transformers to make sure equipment hasn't been damaged and is in good working condition.

Outages

Some equipment must be accessed in the event of a power outage. If the equipment is inaccessible it can cause longer outages for you and your neighbors.

Locked Gate

If your property has a gate that requires a key, OEC can provide a lock that can be used as a link with your lock and opened with the key held by OEC. We respect your privacy as a property owner, and will only access our equipment when needed.

Padmount Transformers

Green utility boxes, known as padmount transformers, are part of the supply chain that helps provide power to your neighborhood. Those boxes sit on an easement, which allows us access to them.

What are the green

boxes for? Their job is to step down high-voltage electricity to a lower voltage needed for the underground wires supplying power to the lights and appliances in homes.

Please do not paint, enhance, block, or otherwise obstruct padmount transformers. Do not plant shrubs or trees close to green box transformers or other utility equipment. Limiting or restricting access to the box in your yard could delay restoration work during an outage and creates a serious safety hazard. We need at least 10 feet of clearance in front of the transformer (the side that is padlocked), as well as four feet of clearance on the other three sides.

Power Poles

Please keep utility poles free from all personal materials such as balloons, fliers, and metal objects like staples or tacks. By respecting utility poles, you can help keep your community powered, and your local utility workers safe.

Utility workers use specialized climbing devices to perform regular maintenance and repair damaged power lines at the top of utility poles. Nails, tacks, and other metal objects that are used to attach objects to utility poles can interfere with the safe operation of the climbing boots used by utility workers.



Foreign objects (215301) that are embedded in utility poles can also snag or damage the protective clothing that keeps line workers safe from electrical shock.

Meters

Meters must have a clear and unrestricted path for access at all times. They should not be located in areas that are inconvenient to enter or where privacy is desired. This isn't ideal for our crews, is costly to the co-op, and it can be dangerous.

Meters should be placed 36 to 66 inches from the ground and should not be enclosed in any way.

If we can't access the meter, we will be contacting you to schedule a meeting on-site to relocate the meter pedestal.

By respecting all utility equipment, including meters and transformers, you can help keep the power on and your local utility workers safe.



Meters should be located so accessibility will not be obstructed by future alterations or additions.

- Entries must be submitted to OEC no later than May 17, 2021

Community Change provides funds for worthwhile causes, including medical or financial hardships, educational purposes, and charitable organizations. It is funded by volunteer donations from OEC members, allowing them the opportunity to give back to our local communities. When a member signs up, their electric bills are simply rounded up to the next whole dollar amount. The monthly roundup could be as little as a single penny, but never more than 99 cents. The average donation is \$6 annually, which is tax deductible.

The funds are held separately from any Oconto Electric Cooperative funds and are administered by a board of trustees, made up of Oconto Electric members. Applications are submitted for grants and these are reviewed quarterly for disbursement of funds.

To date, Community Change has donated \$211,500 to families in need,

charitable organizations, and house fire victims. Thank you to our participating OEC members for your generous support.

The Suring Area Historical Society was awarded \$4,000 for lighting and electrical updates. You can tour the historical society on the first and third Saturday of each month from 10 a.m.–3 p.m., May through September. An additional \$1,200 was awarded to the Oconto Falls Area Chamber of Commerce. The funding will be used towards the purchase of two kayak launches that will be installed at beaches in Oconto Falls.
