

# **RATE CHANGES**

n today's modern, connected world, having a source of safe, reliable, and affordable electricity is crucial. That's what Oconto Lelectric Cooperative strives to deliver to you all day, every day. We're proud of our efforts to serve your needs with competitively priced electricity, responsive member service, proactive and necessary investments in the electricity delivery grid, all while maintaining the financial ability to pay out capital credits on a regular basis.

Please keep in mind that your local electric cooperative is a notfor-profit utility. It always has been OEC's goal to provide the highest quality electric service at the least cost possible. Our rates are designed not to make a profit, but simply cover the costs of providing that power.

This is our first rate change in four years, and your electricity rates will continue to remain highly competitive, as all utilities in the area are facing similar cost pressures. Our residential rates are going up a little more than 3%. Elsewhere around our service territory, some utilities are raising rates by as much 6% beginning in January, and as much as 14% by the end of 2023.

The past two years of the COVID-19 pandemic have caused supplychain disruptions in manufacturing, warehousing, and shipping. These have led to all kinds of product price increases on items required to build and maintain our system.

The facility charge covers the basic cost of bringing electricity to each account location. It covers expenses the cooperative incurs regardless of how much electricity is sold.

The facility charge covers things such as:

- Substation equipment and property;
- Trucks and equipment;
- · Wire, transformers, meters, and power poles needed to build and maintain the electric distribution system.

All members benefit from having reliable electric service available when they need it, and the facility charge ensures that all members pay their fair share of the basic costs. Some of our members use a lot of electricity all year long, and some may use electricity only one or two months per year. Whether you use a lot or a little, the cost of getting electric power to your home remains the same.


#### The new rates will be effective December 1 and will be reflected on the bill you receive in January.

- Farm & Residential: The monthly facility charge will increase from \$30.70/mo to \$35.70/mo for single phase and \$53.75/mo to \$58.75/mo for three phase
- Seasonal & Non-residential: The monthly facility charge will increase from \$31.20/mo to \$36.25/mo
- Farm & Residential Time of Use: The monthly facility charge will increase from \$31.20/mo to \$36.20/mo for single phase and \$53.75/mo to \$59.25/mo for three phase
- Small Commercial, Seasonal & Non-residential **Time of Use:** The monthly facility charge will increase from \$31.70/mo to \$36.75/mo for single phase and \$53.75/mo to \$59.30/mo for three phase
- Small Commercial: The monthly facility charge will increase from \$31.20/mo to \$36.45/mo for single phase and \$53.75/mo to \$59.00/mo for three phase
- Small Commercial Group Service Three Phase: The monthly facility charge will increase from \$34.20/ mo to \$39.45/mo
- Small Commercial Time of Use Group Service
- Three Phase: The monthly facility charge will increase from \$34.20/mo to \$39.95/mo
- Large Commercial Time of Use: The energy charge will increase from \$.0631/kWh on peak to \$.0694/kWh and \$.0461/kWh off peak to \$.0507/kWh
- Large Power Time of Use: The energy charge will increase from \$.0524/kWh on peak to \$.0561/kWh and \$.0469/kWh off peak to \$.0502/kWh
- Irrigation: The energy charge will increase from \$.0524/kWh on peak to \$.0561/kWh and \$.0469/kWh off peak to \$.0502/kWh
- Community Facility: The monthly facility charge will increase from \$19/mo to \$22/mo




























#### District meetings serve an important function

Each year we have district meetings in accordance with your cooperative's bylaws. The district meeting serves as a prelude to the upcoming annual meeting in April. The meeting is held to place names on the ballot for director positions.

As a member of Oconto Electric Cooperative, you have a unique opportuni-

ty to take an active role in the business of your electric cooperative—because you're not just (267900) a customer, you're a member-owner too.

The profits made by OEC go to you in the form of capital credits. The control lies with our board of directors. The seven people on our board are all local people who live and work in this area and are elected by you. The decisions they make affect their lives as much as yours and mine. You, our member, can help decide who guides our cooperative.

In January, members in Districts four and six will be able to nominate candidates for election for the upcoming board of director terms. The

Blocked air vents force your heating system to work harder than necessary and increase pressure in your ductwork, which can cause cracks and leaks to form.

Make sure all air vents are unobstructed from furniture, drapes or other items to ensure sufficient circulation throughout your home. If necessary, purchase a vent extender, which can be placed over a vent to redirect air flow from underneath furniture.
