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FARM BREAKFASTS ARE FAMILY-FRIENDLY

THERE IS SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE TO ENJOY ON THE FARM

Kohls Dairy in Oconto County is hosting Breakfast on the Farm on June 11. In 1942, Kohls Dairy Farm began with 13 cows and two horses. It is currently a fourth-generation dairy run by Curt and his daughter Michelle, along with seven highly dedicated, full-time employees. This will be the third time that the farm has hosted Oconto County Breakfast on the Farm.

Kohls Dairy prides itself on being stewards of the 1,300 acres of land they manage. Herd health, with a focus on optimum cow comfort and nutrition, is top priority. Cows relax on waterbeds, walk on rubber floors, and spend their days in climate-controlled conditions. Their new barn, built in 2022, features the latest in cattle-housing technology. The energyefficient barn is regulated by four thermostats that will control the automatic curtains, fans, and water sprinklers.

The Kohls primarily raise Holsteins with a few Brown Swiss mixed in. They are currently milking 500 cows three times a day in a double 12 parallel parlor. All cows are given an Allflex Electric Identification Ear Tag to monitor the herd. The ear tag watches each cow 24/7, and reports changes instantly ranging from reproduction, health, and nutrition.

Curt Kohls wants visitors to see what really happens on a Wisconsin dairy farm and what it takes to get milk onto their tables. He hopes that visitors will learn at least one new positive thing about the dairy industry that day.

(162301) Loads will dry faster and more evenly if you separate heavier cottons like linens and towels from your lightweight clothing.
