DEVELOPING YOUNG LEADERS AT YLC

Suring high school junior Tucker Hischke and Lena high school sophomore Lucas Koslowsky were OEC's delegates to the 2024 Wisconsin Youth Leadership Conference (YLC), held July 16–18 at UW-Stout. Throughout the three-day event, students met friends from around the state, experienced life on a college campus, and learned more about honing their own personal leadership skills from dynamic speakers and activities.

Highlights for the students included motivational speaker Craig Hillier's message on Breakthrough Leadership. He told students that leaders must learn how to turn their setbacks into comebacks, respect differences, and take responsibility for their actions rather than playing the victim. Craig's workshop kept the students engaged through interactive activities, discussions, and stories.

The second night was the formal etiquette dinner, where students had the opportunity to learn basic etiquette for social and professional situations.

The students were also divided into six cooperative districts, where they developed their leadership skills and cooperative knowledge with students from other schools. Each district was given a cooperative principle and they had to come up with a TikTok video. This activity kept the students and their district chaperones very engaged.

There is no reset button in life

Ben Bella, safety and loss control manager, was my favorite presenter at the conference. He started off his session talking to the students about safe driving. You need to be a defensive driver and watch out for the drivers around you. This discussion led into how decision making is a process.

"How many of you have ever made a bad decision?" asked Ben. Many raised their hands. "Okay, that bad decision, how can it affect your life or someone else's? We never know what the consequences will be," said Ben.

He then broke it down into the five steps of bad decision making:

#1 Not Thinking — We have two brains, the fast side and slow side. Fast makes 95% of our decisions and what we are

trained to do and react to. Slow is like well...let me think about that. The fast brain takes over when trying to use that side. **#2 Validation** — You're at a vulnerable age. You might be making decisions on what someone else's thoughts are on you. (99801)

#3 Consequences — Everything we do has consequences but we do it anyway.

#4 Follow your plan and not your mood — impulse. If you are really excited or in a bad mood, don't make any quick decisions. This is a fast brain decision. You need to count to ten to slow down your brain to make the right choice. Ben compared this to our actions and our words. You can't take them back. He compared it to a tube of toothpaste. Once you squeeze it out, you can't put it back in.

#5 Self control — If we had a rear-view mirror to make our decisions we would make better ones.

Ben shared the following quote: "There is no reset button in life. You can't take anything back, and you can't undo anything. All of your actions have consequences, and the things you say and do today will have a lasting impact on the rest of your life. You have to understand that, and you have to be aware of it while making your decisions."

The dates for next year's Youth Leadership Conference are July 15–17. If anyone is hesitant to go, I highly recommend going!—*Katie Jagiello*
