



VETERANS WAITED TO HEAR TWO SIMPLE WORDS WELCOME HOME

ld Glory Honor Flight (OGHF) is an organization based out of Appleton that is dedicated to transporting our local WWII, Korean, and Vietnam War veterans to Washington, D.C., to see the memorials built in their honor. It is a one-day trip and completely free of charge to the veteran.

The mission of OGHF would not be successful without the help of their guardians. Each veteran is accompanied by a guardian, usually a family member. If a veteran doesn't have anyone to accompany them, OGHF will provide one. Their role is to ensure that every veteran has a safe and memorable experience.

Amy Winkler, an employee of Oconto Electric Cooperative, went on her first OGHF as a guardian in 2014. On October 23, Winkler will have gone on her ninth mission as a guardian.

What made you sign up to be a guardian?

I wanted to give back to our veterans. They gave so much for our freedom and this was a good way to show them how much I appreciated what they did and to say "Thank you." Being an OGHF guardian is one of the best things that I have ever done! I talked about it so much and spoke so highly of it then, that now my husband goes on the missions also.

Is there a cost to be a guardian?

Yes, I pay \$500 for every mission that I have the honor of going on.

What does a guardian do?

We are expected to be there for our vets and let them know how much they are appreciated. We need to contact the vet ahead of the mission to introduce ourself. If the vet has someone on "The Wall" they would like to make an etching of, you would look that up ahead of time to know where to look. We let them know facts about the memorials that we visit or monuments that we may drive by (tour guide). We may need to push them in wheelchairs as it is a lot of walking. I take a lot of pictures of them throughout the day so I can create a book for them to remember the day and share their experience with family and friends. This day is all about them and you need to smile and make them feel like a "king/queen for the day." I have created a lot of friendships by doing this and discovered a lot of things that the history books do not tell you.


Every veteran deserves this chance to go and experience this amazing mission that is meant to say "Thank you!"

THANKFUL TO OUR MEMBERS FOR 25 YEARS OF CHARITABLE GIVING

OEC is committed to the communities we serve. We support local schools, community organizations, and agencies through donations and programs that OEC offers. Many OEC employees are active with local groups and organizations, which enrich the cooperative's relationship with the people we serve.

Since 1999 Oconto Electric members have had the opportunity to participate in a wonderful program called Community Change. Members can sign up to have their electric bills rounded up to the next whole dollar, with the extra money going into the Community Change fund.

Community Change has a board of directors (a group of seven volunteers who are co-op members not employed by OEC) that meets quarterly in March, June, September, and December to review applications for Community Change funds. Grants are awarded based on how much money is available and whether or not the purpose of the request is consistent with Community Change guidelines. The Community Change board has awarded over \$40,000 to house fire victims and over \$200,000 in donations since 2000.

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Ground broke for new substation

September 9, OEC broke ground for a new substation/transmission switch yard. This substation will replace an existing substation that is adjacent to the new one in Oconto Falls. The current substation is nearing the end of its lifecycle. The concrete foundation is deteriorating and we continue to replace failing parts.

The new substation will improve reliability for members. Additionally, the facility size was increased to allow for any future expansion such as battery storage, or solar when that technology becomes more cost effective. (1183500)

Electrical substations are a critical piece of our infrastructure, serving to increase or decrease the voltage of power as it moves through the grid.

The new substation is expected to be completed in May of 2025.



Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

If you're heading out of town during the holiday season, remember to set your home to vacation mode. You can save energy while you're away by lowering your thermostat a few degrees or creating an "away" schedule with a smart or programmable thermostat. Newer water heaters include a vacation mode setting to help you save on water heating costs, or you can simply lower the temperature manually.

Small actions can also stack up to energy savings. Unplug devices that consume energy when they're not in use, including phone chargers, toothbrush chargers, TVs, and gaming consoles.
